# A JOURNEY OF FAITH

I spent my first eight school years at St. Margaret Mary's. For reasons unknown to me, my parents sent me to public high school rather than one of the several Catholic schools available at the time. During my high school years, I drifted away from the church. As I grew and gained more freedom, I stopped attending Mass and receiving the sacraments. This all took place well before Vatican II. I only knew of the Latin Mass. Altar boys were taught to learn the Latin responses by rote. Neither they nor the parishioners were encouraged to actually understand the words. As soon as the nuns were no longer in my life, the process just stopped. The message that remained with me was, "Do this and don't do that, or you'll go to hell."

Timing is everything. For boys entering their teens, within a few short years, exposure to girls, beer, cigarettes, and cars prevails. At least, those were the important things in my life. This would have been the critical time in life for the nuns and brothers to continue riding herd. Instead, high school, college, marriage, job, children — all came to pass without attention to the Lord or His Church. My wife and I were married in the Church with a Presbyterian minister and a priest on the altar. My dad would have been heartbroken otherwise. But moving on, I didn't practice the faith nor did I raise my children in the Church. (The latter remains my greatest regret to this day.) Life went reasonably well for us, and we seemed content.

In 2003, I began to feel the Lord calling. To be sure, the psychologists speak of running *toward* desire and running *away* from the undesirable. I'm sure the Lord uses both methods when it's time to round us up. And there was a little of both in place early in 2003 for me. Christ the King was my father's church. Lacking reason to look elsewhere, I began to make random visits. At off hours, only the Lord and I were there. I began to feel a little better. I began to meet with Fr. Pat Butler, and in time the message became clear: examine my conscience and confess my sins, and I would regain my status as a practicing Catholic. Easy? Try remembering all the sins from the past 50 years. But it was done, and it was wonderful.

I began to attend Mass on Sundays and occasional weekdays. Renewing my relationship with the Lord and experiencing the Eucharist was very rewarding, but within a short time I began to feel that something was still missing. Within the Church, there is a universe of information, tradition, prayer, and much more. Many of these things can be grasped only by a mature adult mind. Everything I knew about the church was experienced when I was a child, and it was mostly in Latin. At that time, I had not even heard of RCIA. In time, I became aware of the process and spoke with the Director of Faith Formation. It seems that the RCIA was thought of as a resource for non-Catholics. But in conversations with the director, it was agreed that I could "audit the course" if I'd like to. I went on to participate in RCIA three times: twice at CTK and once in Boston with my daughter, who had heard the call shortly after I did.

In 2003, I returned to the Church after a 50-year absence. My mind and heart overflowed with everything Catholic. The RCIA helped me become closer to the Lord. Today, I associate with people of our faith. I feel comfortable in conversations at any level. I've attended several types of group sessions and feel at ease there. My knowledge of our faith and its liturgy and tradition all resulted from RCIA. I would recommend to anyone to look into the RCIA experience.
